We encourage our readers to submit poetry, fiction, scholarly articles, commentaries, political or economic analyses, review articles and artwork to the Editors-in-Chief. Since we publish three issues per year, we continuously accept submissions. Though we occasionally publish special, thematic issues, most issues treat a broad range of topics. So, please, feel free to submit all of your Africa-related work.

## **Multi-Mediating Africa: Emerging Artistic and Technological Re/presentations**

To follow the 2007 UCLA African Activist Association Conference, entitled "Multi-Mediating Africa: Emerging Artistic and Technological Re/presentations," UFAHAMU is publishing a special issue that will include work presented at the conference. The theme of conference highlighted ways that Africans leverage and negotiate locality in a globalized world to encourage discourse on how Africa is represented. The special issue is also open to submissions beyond the conference agenda and we at UFAHAMU are **actively seeking submissions of articles thematically related to multi-media: use of internet, digital technology, emerging artistic media, and new ways of using traditional media.** Submissions should not be limited to scholarly articles, but also include political-economic analysis, commentaries, film and book reviews, short fiction, and poetry.
